

Address by Mrs. Maryam Rajavi,

the President-elect of the National Council of Resistance of Iran

March in Solidarity with the Uprising and the Iranian Resistance for Regime Change
June 21, 2019
Washington, D.C.

Greetings to you, to the elected representatives of the American people who are here, and to personalities and long-time friends and supporters of the Iranian people's Resistance for democracy and human rights. They have all come today to stand with you.

Congratulations on the anniversary of the resistance, June 20, the Day of Martyrs and Political Prisoners, and on the anniversary of the founding of the Army of Freedom; a movement that has unceasingly forged ahead in all theatres for four decades, relying on its own toil, struggle and sacrifice.

To fend off the people's fury, for forty years, the murderous mullahs have pointed their fingers at the U.S. as the enemy. But we were not deceived. As the Iranian Resistance' Leader Massoud Rajavi has said: "When we declared 'down with the reactionaries,' we stood by it. We have and will continue to declare that what we seek is the regime's overthrow, overthrow, overthrow."

Now, the people of Iran cry out in every street and alley that "our enemy is right here; the mullahs lie when they say America is the enemy."

The absurd comments made by the mullahs and their Foreign Minister about the so-called "B Team" in the United States was a bid to hide their own "Bomb team": From developing a nuclear bomb to bombing plots in Albania and France, to bombings and planting of mines on oil tankers in the Persian Gulf, to the explosions, drones and missile attacks on Saudi Arabia and targeting of the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad.

When the mullahs are not held accountable and do not pay a price for their actions, they become more emboldened and intensify their belligerence. Launching Katyusha missiles in Mosul and Basra and the missile attack against a US drone are very telling examples of this fact.

For the past forty years, the regime has persistently waged wars against the people of Iran and the world. Still, regime apologists and those who benefit from its continued rule feign concern for war. They use this as a pretext to dissuade the world from adopting any form of decisiveness, and instead urge appeasement of the ruling murderers in Iran.

The main victims, however, are the people of Iran. The experience of the past 40 years has demonstrated that the mullahs' theocratic regime is incapable of any reform or change of behavior. Indeed, as a (Persian) saying goes, "a viper will never give birth to a dove." Khamenei says that change in the regime's behavior is tantamount to regime change.

Consider the American Declaration of Independence. The question before George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin and their comrades and supporters was the same. And, similarly, our answer is the same: To resist and fight until victory.

Three months ago, for the first time in the past 70 years, the President of the United States in his Nowruz (Persian New Year) message to the people of Iran attested to the fact that:

"The Iranian people desire to reclaim their country's proud history, expressive culture, and rightful place on the world stage. They deserve a government that is accountable to them and that treats them with dignity and respect."

He emphasized: "We pledge never to turn a deaf ear to the calls of the Iranian people for freedom, and we will never forget their ongoing struggle for human rights."

Yes, we do not want anything more than freedom and human rights, which will of



course also open the way for us toward development and justice. This will ensue peace and security in Iran and the Middle East; an Iran free of religious fascism, a non-nuclear Iran and an Iran without terrorism and belligerence.

The religious dictatorship is a paper tiger when it comes to facing off with the Iranian Resistance. And its fate is no different from the fate of the Shah's dictatorship. This is the verdict of history and the yearning of the people of Iran. (Excerpts)



Congressman Brad Sherman (D-CA)

Hello, I'm Brad Sherman from California's best named city, Sherman Oaks.

And with me here is my daughter, Molly Sherman, who is beginning to learn how we need to fight for human rights around the world.

This is a regime known for its mass executions, its jailing of journalists, its fueling of extremism around the region. And Iranians have stood up. At great risk to themselves, they have shouted, "No Gaza, No Lebanon, No Syria, My Life For Iran." We stand in solidarity with brave Iranians who are fighting for a new chapter in this great nation's history. This new chapter will be written by Iranians, not by Americans. Democracy will come to Iran from Iran, not from U.S. military intervention.

This regime may be on its last legs. It is acting with desperation. Desperate to distract people from its own corruption. I want to also take this opportunity to commend Madame Rajavi for her advocacy for democracy, women's rights, and minority rights in Iran.



Democracy and equality are not just principles we hold dear, they are rights that belong to people and we uphold these ideals, we uphold them around the world and across Iran. I am the chief Democratic sponsor of House Res. 374, a resolution supporting the people of Iran, free expression, and condemning the Iranian regime for its deprivation for human rights.

I have been dedicated to helping those who are trying to achieve democracy in Iran, whether it be in the meeting with the Prime minister of Albania to make sure that Iranian exiles there are protected, whether it be to fight against hostage taking by the Iranian regime. I look forward to joining all with you as an observer in the next step when we will see a free election in Iran. (*Excerpts*)



Congressman Tom McClintock (R-CA)

Thank you all. Thank you each and every one of you for being here today. You know, the Iranian freedom movement has not just endured, it has grown dramatically as the injustices and atrocities of the illegitimate Iranian regime have become so widespread and so despised. want to tell you how proud I am. I've been with you for ten years. And I want to tell you the strength of the movement is an American, and I know there are a lot of Iranian Americans, it's bipartisan. It's Democrats and Republicans. And you've heard today from Republican and Democratic leaders.

You heard Mrs. Rajavi's statement. I'm going to talk positive. You know, we've had the general, we've had so many talk about the issues relating to the regime. We need a new regime. And that regime is you, the MEK, NCRI, the alternative. And I'm going to tell you why. I'm going to tell you why. The future decided by the ballot, not by dictatorships. That's number one. Number two, democracy, human rights. Standing for freedom of assembly, freedom of speech. Standing for human rights of people. Number three, abolition of the death penalty. No executions. (*Excerpts*)






General (Ret.) Jack Kean, Former Vice Chief of Staff of the United States Army

Hello, Iran. Hello, the Iranian people. And my fellow Americans. 2018, 2018 was a major turning point for Iran. Why? The United States pulled out of the nuclear deal and for the first time in 39 years, put Iran on notice. Iran, you're malign and aggressive behavior in the Middle East region is now going to be held accountable.

The maximum pressure campaign is working. Iran is choking on the sanctions. Iran's recent provocations tell the story, disrupting the oil flow in the Persian Gulf and the Gulf of Oman, attacking Saudi Arabia pipeline and its airport, and attacking a U.S. drone just recently. These provocations have two purposes. One, to leverage the international community to pressure the United States to remove the sanctions. Two, to convince the countries in the region that the United States cannot protect them. Both of those will fail. The United States will not back



down. To those who say the United States is provoking this crisis, you don't know the facts. It is Iran who blew up two U.S. embassies in Lebanon and Kuwait, killing hundreds.

The United States will do what? The United States will lead a coalition of nations to keep the shipping lanes open in the Persian Gulf and the Gulf of Oman. That will unfold in the days ahead. United States will not, I say again not tolerate Iran enriching uranium to a threshold capability and certainly to a nuclear capability. This will be a redline for the United States. The United States will not ease off on sanctions until Iran changes. There has never been a time when an American president has been so committed to fundamental change in Iran. (Excerpts)





Bob Torricelli, former Democratic Senator from New Jersey

To our friends in Europe and the United Nations, if Iran were a nation in Europe you wouldn't tolerate the mullahs, the theocracy, the death, the jailing, the executions, the terrorism. You wouldn't tolerate it for a minute.

There are many things that I love about America. And one of them is our optimism, our belief in freedom, our belief in peace. These are great qualities of America. But sometimes, sometimes, Mr. Secretary and Mr. President, we need to accept reality. The reality is the mullahs will never change, they will develop nuclear weapons, they will spread terror, they will never let the Iranian people go. We need regime change and we need it now.

The Iranian people deserve what all people deserve, a free country of their own. Secretary Pompeo, President Trump, we stand with you in representing this country, its best values, its finest hopes. But in this struggle we ask only this. As you stand for the best in America, stand for the best of the Iranian people who want nothing more than a future for their children and to live a free life. We stand with you, Mr. Secretary, Mr. President, please stand with us. (Excerpts)

Dr. Ramesh Sepherrad

Thank you very much. My fellow Iranian-Americans, my name is Ramesh Sepehrrad, a scholar practitioner from George Mason University and a proud member of advisory board for the Iranian American Organizations.

For years, previous administrations, both Republicans and Democrats, offered goodwill gestures. Some even marginalized our voices and looked the other way when our loved ones were attacked and killed in Camp Ashraf. But all those have failed. - 4. Additional sanctions is needed, and yes, expel all Iranian agents of Ministry of Intelligence and the IRGC from the U.S, including those abusing our media and academic institutions as a cover for providing material support for the regime's terrorist entities.
- **5.** We are here in person so that our message does not get lost in the partisan noise in Washington DC.
- **6.** We call on the United States to prosecute all of the Ministry of Intelligence and IRGC agents who are still operating in the U.S. under different covers. (*Excerpts*)
